Characteristics of the Intensive Japanese Language Program

Students are admitted to the one-year Core Program in either spring or fall. Depending on a student's future plans, further Japanese study is possible in six-month increments.

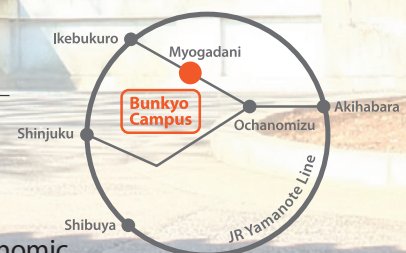

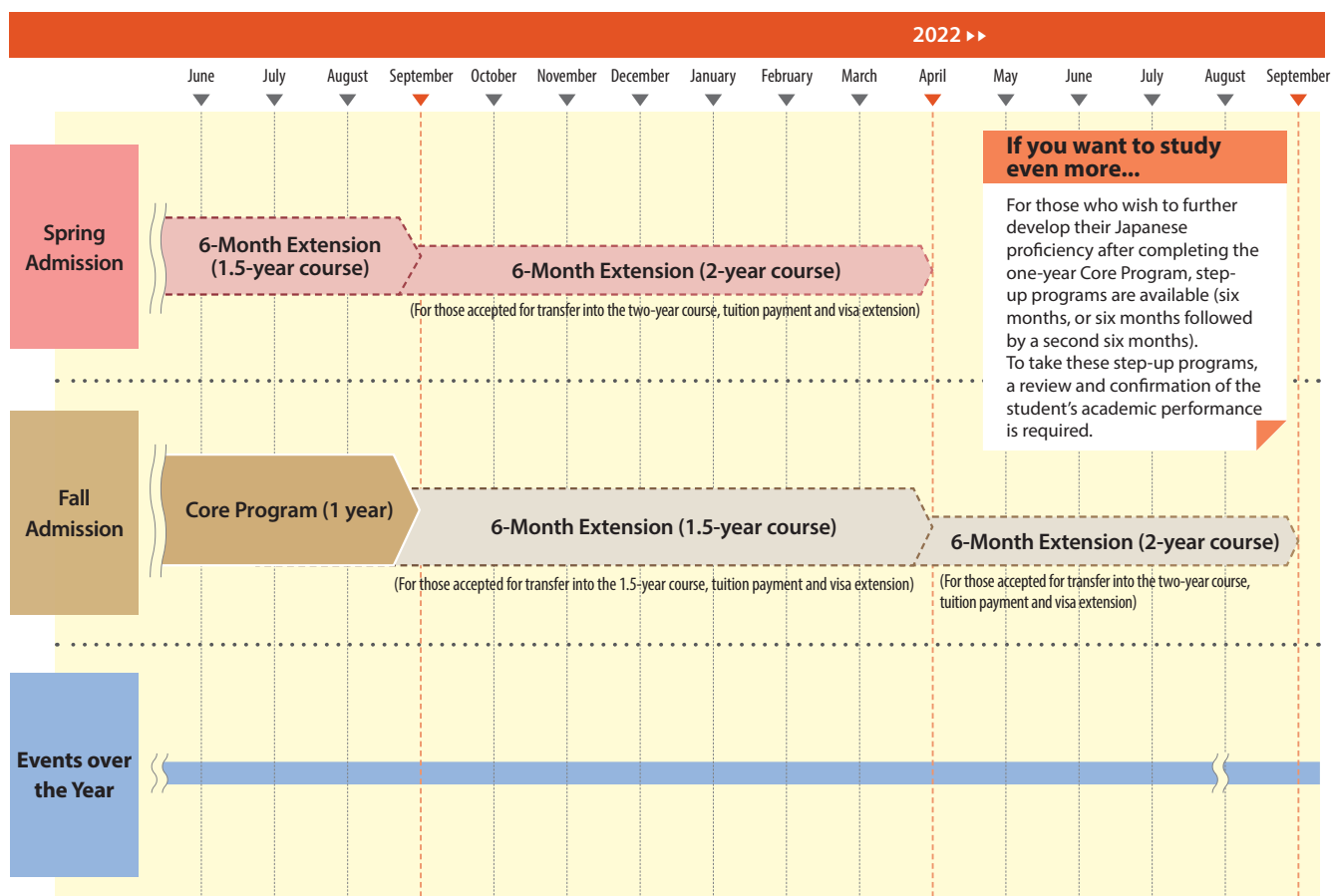
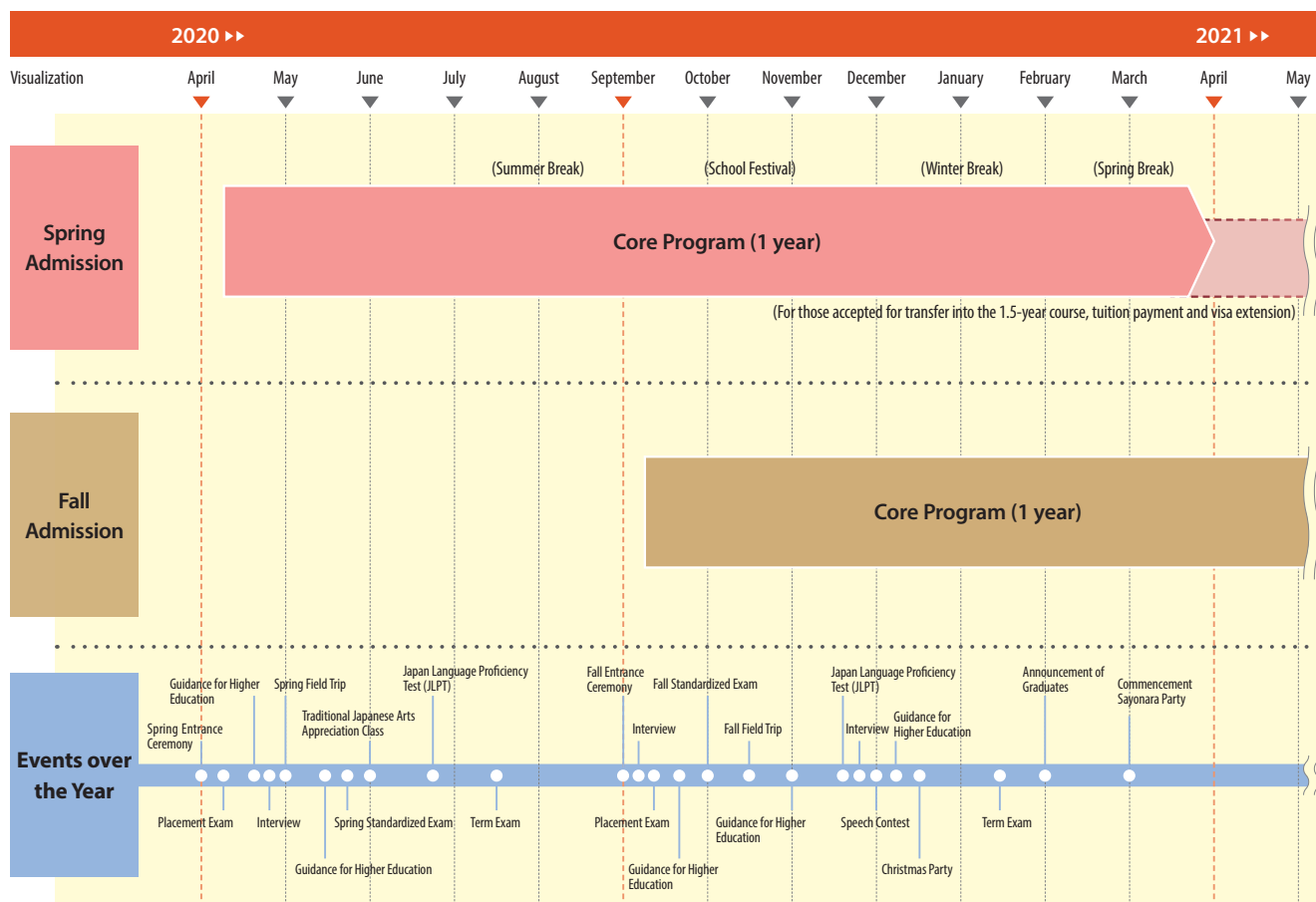
Our Intensive Japanese Language Program (IJLP) has been helping students develop their Japanese language capabilities since 1972 and has graduated some 4,700 students in total.

Course Structure*

Students enroll in IJLP for one year in either the spring or fall, and advance according to their planned post-program path.





Required Subjects (examples from the 2019 academic year)

Students must take all the required subjects listed here in order to graduate.

English	<p>Focused on English grammar and reading skills to prepare students for lectures. Aims to improve writing, reading, speaking and listening abilities. Classes are offered in different levels.</p> <p>1 Grammar 2 Reading 3 Introductory</p>
Japanese Studies	<p>Provides core knowledge of Japanese society, lifestyles and culture in order to deepen the students' knowledge of Japan. Students will participate in spring and fall field trips and traditional Japanese arts appreciation classes.</p>



Electives (Examples from the 2019 Academic Year)

Students will choose from among the following subjects to meet their needs in preparing for university entrance examinations.

Math (Humanities or Science)	Classes tailored to the Examination for Japanese University Admission for International Students (EJU) (Mathematics 1 for Liberal Arts majors; Mathematics 2 for Science majors)
Chemistry/Physics/Biology	For EJU's Science examinations.
Modern Society / Geography and History	For EJU's Japan and the World examinations.
Introductory Japanese	Builds the foundations in the Japanese language.
TOEIC Tactics / TOEFL Tactics	Improves the TOEIC/TOEFL scores required for university and graduate school entrance examinations.



Japanese Levels

Students advance according to their Japanese proficiency.

High-level	Develops near-native level Japanese skills and the ability to carry out academic-level discussions and presentations or negotiations at work.
Advanced	Develops Japanese skills for a wide range of situations such as lectures, work, etc. and also for dealing with abstract topics in Japanese. Develops the language skills necessary to pass Level N1 of the Japanese Language Proficiency Test, which is required to proceed to undergraduate or graduate study in Japan.
Upper-Intermediate	Will understand Japanese in a wide range of situations such as lectures, work, etc. and expand the range of topics that can be handled in Japanese. Develops the language skills necessary to pass Level N2 of the Japanese Language Proficiency Test, which is the minimum level required to study at a vocational school or university in Japan.
Intermediate	Learns Japanese expressions and vocabulary for daily situations, equivalent to what is tested on Level N3 of the Japanese Language Proficiency Test. Develops the ability to communicate with native Japanese speakers and express one's own opinions and ideas.
Advanced Beginner	Will understand Japanese expressions and vocabulary for use in daily situations and be able to deal with familiar topics without preparation. Kanji and vocabulary will be strengthened as a bridge to intermediate-level Japanese.
Beginner	Acquires basic knowledge of Japanese for use in limited daily situations (shopping, placing an order, asking where a place is, arranging to meet, etc.) and being able to give simple responses.
Foundations	Will understand basic knowledge of Japanese and be able to listen to instructions, make requests, etc., and give simple responses.

Guidance for higher education

Admission to Takushoku University Institutions

- Exam system for admission by recommendation for Takushoku University and Takushoku University Hokkaido College (recommendation criteria apply)
- Transfer exam system for students with certified credits at an educational institute in the home country to attend Takushoku University.
- Students accepted at Takushoku University and Takushoku University Hokkaido College will have part of the admission fee waived

Spring and fall field trips, traditional Japanese arts appreciation classes

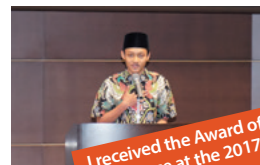
